1.1 VOTES OF CONGRATULATIONS

An Chomhairle unanimously extended the following vote of congratulations.

2. **MINUTES**

- (a) Special Meeting of Committee of Whole Council held on 24th September, 2001 were considered and approved.
- (b) Minutes of Ordinary Meeting held on 24th September, 2001 were considered .
On the proposal of Comhairleoir M Ahern it was agreed to approve the minutes with the word proposed omitted from Item 4.
- (c) Minutes of Special Meeting of An Chomhairle held on 1st October 2001 were considered and approved.

3. **QUESTION TIME**

3.1 **RESOURCES FOR LOCAL AREA DEVELOPMENT PLANS**

In response to question submitted by Comhairleoir S. Martin, the following written reply was circulated which stated that it is an objective of the Corporate Plan that Local Plans be carried out for areas of the city as considered appropriate. The priority for 2002 will be to carry out the City Development Plan Review, which must formally commence by March. However, a programme of work for the Planning Department is being drawn up at present in the context of Better Local Government and the issue of resource allocation for local plans will be considered as part of this. The programme will be brought to the Development and Planning SPC and to Council early in the new year.

3.2 **ILLEGALLY PARKED CARS AT LEE GARAGE, SOUTH TERRACE**

In response to question submitted by Seanoir C. O'Connell, the following written reply was circulated which stated that Parking tickets are issued to vehicles in the vicinity of Lee Garage on a regular basis. In the last three months 432 tickets have been issued in this area and a considerable proportion of these would have been issued to vehicles associated with the Lee Garage.

Management in Lee Garage have in the past complained to the Traffic Engineers, the Traffic Warden Supervisors and Public Representatives because tickets are being issued to such vehicles. However it has been pointed out to them that the area fronting their premises is a public road and as such it would have to be patrolled in a fair and reasonable manner similar to any other public road in the city.

3.3 **REPLACEMENT OF WINDOWS AT GLENAMOY LAWN, MAYFIELD, CORK**

In response to question submitted by Seanoir M. Quill, the following written reply was circulated which stated that the windows in houses at Glenamoy Lawn, Mayfield are proposed to be replaced under contract. Tenders for this contract have been received and are currently being examined. It is anticipated that the contract will be awarded within a matter of weeks and it is hoped that work will be carried out before the end of 2001.

3.4 **TAKING IN CHARGE OF GLENRYAN MEWS, BLARNEY STREET**

In response to question submitted by Comhairleoir B. Allen T.D, the following written reply was circulated which stated that Cork Corporation has been in contact with the developer on numerous occasions. The developer had promised to complete the outstanding works. However the development is still incomplete. The public lighting (2 lamps) is now due to be reconnected on 8/10/01, and is still the responsibility of the developer.

3.5 **KNOCKNAHEENY MASTERPLAN**

In response to question submitted by Seanoir D. McCarthy, the following written reply was circulated which stated that plans for Block D, Knocknaheeny are at an advanced stage and are the subject of on-going discussions with the Department of the Environment & Local Government. At this stage, the plans involve refurbishment of existing units, an element of new build and some demolition. The precise nature and scale of the proposals will be subject to the agreement and approval of the Department of the Environment & Local Government. It is anticipated that plans will be finalised before the end of November, 2001 at which time public consultation and the statutory Part X Planning Process will be undertaken.

The Masterplan document has been submitted to the Department of the Environment & Local Government with a view to having it approved by Government as the framework document to guide the regeneration of the area. It is considered appropriate that the model would be put on public display once approval has been granted.

3.6 **TREES AT KNOCKLAUN AND ARD ALAINN, ST. LUKES**

In response to question submitted by Comhairleoir T Brosnan, the following written reply was circulated which stated that the self-seeded Buddleia trees will be removed from the retaining wall within the next week.

3.7 **LANDSCAPE PARK FOR MAHON**

In response to question submitted by Comhairleoir D. Clune T.D., the following written reply was circulated which stated that draft proposals for the local park at Loughmahon Road are presently being finalised and it is anticipated that consultation with local residents will take place during November.

A new car park to facilitate users of the Shoreline amenity walkway is under construction and will be completed in early December 2001.

A detailed survey of the lands identified for sports pitches has now been completed and the various proposals are being considered and costed.

4. **SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS**

Seanoir T. Shannon proposed and Comhairleoir S. Martin seconded a suspension of Standing Orders to discuss the reasons for the non-attendance by officials at a meeting in the Department on Wednesday, 3rd October 2001 to discuss funding for the Douglas Swimming Pool and the background to the meeting between Corporation and Department officials held on 17th August 2001.

As more than two thirds of the members present supported the proposal, An t-Ard-Mheára declared the proposal carried.

A discussion on the matters relating to the meeting between Corporation and Department officials held on 17th August 2001 and the non-attendance by officials at the meeting in the Department on Wednesday, 3rd October 2001 took place.

The City Manager stated that it was accepted practice that delegations were accompanied by senior management. It was his understanding that a request had been received from Council members that no officials accompany members to the meeting.

With regard to the meeting held in August, the City Manager stated that it is not unusual for progress meetings to be held between Corporation and Department Officials.

Several members of the Swimming Pool Sub-Committee advised that no request was made by them that officials should not attend and they were surprised when advised of this matter.

The City Manager advised that a feasibility study was required in order to pursue funding with the Department. Members would be provided with details of this report in due course.

5. **PROPOSED VARIATION (NO.2) TO THE CORK CITY DEVELOPMENT PLAN REVIEW 1998 FOR THE PURPOSE OF INSERTION OF THE CORK PLANNING AUTHORITIES JOINT HOUSING STRATEGY**

The members considered the Manager's report and draft resolution with respect to the making of the proposed variation (No. 2) to the Cork city Development Plan

Review 1998 for the purpose of insertion of the Cork Planning Authorities Joint Housing Strategy, subject to modifications.

Comhairleoir D. Boyle proposed and Comhairleoir K. Lynch seconded a rejection of the wording as set out in item 2, paragraph 3.57(a) and that bullet point No. 2 be amended to read one half ($\frac{1}{2}$) in place of one quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$)

Wallace seconded that the report of the City Manager be approved, and that the following resolution with respect to the making of the proposed variation (No. 2) to the Cork City Development Plan Review 1998 for the purpose of insertion of the Cork Planning Authorities Joint Housing Strategy be adopted:-

Having considered the proper planning and sustainable development of the City and County Borough of Cork, the statutory obligations of any Local Authority in the area and any relevant policies or objectives for the time being of the Government or any Minister of the Government, and having considered the Manager's Report dated the 24th day of September, 2001, it is

“RESOLVED pursuant to the provisions of Section 13 of the Planning and Development Act, 2000 that the Cork City Development Plan Review 1998 be varied in accordance with the draft of the proposed Variation put on display for public comment for a period of 4 weeks from the 31st day of July, 2001 subject to same being modified to provide as follows:

The Cork City Development Plan Review 1998 (hereinafter referred to as “the Plan”) shall be varied in manner following:

1. By the insertion in the Plan as Appendix “A” the Cork Planning Authorities Joint Housing Strategy prepared by Cork Corporation jointly with Cork County Council and the Urban District Councils of Clonakilty, Cobh, Fermoy, Macroom, Mallow, Midleton, Skibbereen, Youghal and Kinsale on or before the 31st day of July, 2001

(otherwise referred to as “the Housing Strategy”) subject to the following amendments to the Housing Strategy:

- a) Some further explanations of technical matters are provided to the appendices of the Housing Strategy. (See attached revised appendices 4,5, and 6)

- b) The following paragraphs are inserted after paragraph 7.3, Volume 1 Implementation & Monitoring):

‘Cork Local Authorities play an important role in influencing housing outcomes in our City and County. The key roles of the Local Authority include:-

- **An Integrated Planning Role:** setting broad policy directions, and land use development strategies and policies; and where appropriate directly implementing these policies.
- **A Regulatory Role:** regulating land use development, building quality, the private rented sector and environmental health, in accordance with national and local planning frameworks.
- **A Promoting Role:** promoting development and working with community agencies and other levels of government for housing outcomes that best address the social, cultural and economic needs of residents.
- **An Amenity Role:** developing, maintaining and preserving open space, parklands, recreational areas and physical infrastructure, so that the residential amenity of local areas is improved.
- **A Facilitating Role:** assisting in the leverage of funds and facilitating development opportunities that create affordable and social housing opportunities.
- **A Landowner Role:** using the Local Authorities’ role as landowner to directly influence the market for housing to achieve established objectives.’

- c) A further table to be added to the appendices (attached), detailing the proposed building programme for each housing authority for the period 2000 to 2003. This table is to be referenced in paragraph 5.25 of the main document.

- d) The following footnote is attached to paragraph 5.1 clarifying the definitions of affordable housing relevant to the housing strategy.
- ‘In calculating the demand for social and affordable housing in Cork, the definition of affordability used is that given in the Planning and Development Act 2000. This states that mortgage repayments, on a house to meet a household’s accommodation needs, should not exceed 35% of net household income (assuming a 90% mortgage). Affordable housing schemes provided directly by the local authority are governed by different legislation and define affordability based on a maximum income of £25,000 (for a single-income household)’.*

- e) On Page 26 (5.36), heading 'Refugees / Asylum Seekers' to be replaced with 'Cultural Diversity' and the following paragraph is to be inserted:

'Cork prides itself on its ethnic, linguistic and cultural diversity. Cork offers a rich cultural heritage comprising many different ethnic groups. The need to develop a long-term housing policy, recognising cultural diversity and the diversity of housing need is acknowledged'.

2. By the insertion after Paragraph **3.57** of the following paragraph:

Paragraph 3.57(a)

It is an objective to implement the Cork Planning Authorities Joint Housing Strategy. (Where there is any discrepancy between the wording of the Housing Strategy and the Development Plan, the Housing Strategy will take precedence.)

The following shall be required by agreement under Part V of the Planning and Development Act, 2000;

- ◆ 20% of all lands zoned solely for residential use or for a mixture of residential and other uses (see amendments regarding zoning in Paragraphs 5.17 and 6.1) shall be reserved for the purposes of social and affordable housing.
- ◆ There will be a requirement that one quarter (1/4) of the reserved land be for social housing and the remainder for affordable housing, subject to the exceptions set out below
- ◆ In wards where there is a high concentration of social housing, there will be no requirement for social housing on reserved lands. Affordable housing only will be required. (These wards are indicated in Map No. 2 of the Housing Strategy).
- ◆ There will be no requirement for social/affordable housing where it is proposed that a site be developed for student housing in accordance with the location and design criteria set out in the Guidelines on Residential Developments for third level students under Section 50 of the Finance Act (detailed in Appendix 7 of the Housing Strategy).

3. By the insertion after Paragraph **5.17** of the following paragraph:

Paragraph 5.17(a)

As outlined in Paragraph 3.57(a) it is an objective to seek the reservation of 20% of all lands zoned for residential use or for a mixture of residential and other uses for the purposes of social and affordable housing, as proposed in the Housing Strategy. 'For the purposes of clarification lands within the Commercial Core Area (coloured white on Fig.5.3 in Cork City Development Plan Review 1998) are considered to be zoned for city centre commercial and residential purposes, with other uses open for consideration'. Lands zoned 'Housing Protection Area' and lands zoned 'General Employment and Residential Uses excluding shopping and offices' (as shown on Fig.5.3) are also considered to include zoning for residential purposes'.

4. By the insertion after paragraph **6.1** of the following paragraph:

Paragraph 6.1(a)

‘As outlined in paragraph 3.57(a) it is an objective to seek the reservation of 20% of all lands zoned for residential use or for a mixture of residential and other uses for the purposes of social and affordable housing, as proposed in the Housing Strategy. For the purposes of clarification lands in the south east, south centre, south west, north west and north east Sectors of the city (as shown on figs. 6.1 - 6.5 respectively of the Cork City Development Plan Review 1998) are considered to be zoned for residential purposes, with other uses open for consideration insofar as they do not conflict with residential or other amenities and insofar as they do not conflict with the policies for shopping and office development outlined in 3.19-31 and unless they are otherwise indicated for a specific alternative purpose.’

The Resolution of Council made on the 24th day of July, 2001 with respect to the adoption of the Housing Strategy Report subject to one amendment is hereby rescinded.
