2. **MINUTES**

Minutes of Ordinary Meeting of Cork County Borough Council held on 12th March 2001 were considered and approved.

3. **QUESTION TIME**

3.1 **BUS STOP AT VICTORIA HOSPITAL**

In response to question submitted by Comhairleoir Sean Martin, the following written reply was circulated which stated that this request was discussed with officials from Bus Eireann who indicate that the area is currently served by a Bus Stop at South Terrace. The provision of a new Bus Stop at Infirmary Road would require discontinuing the existing Bus Stop at South Terrace, as the multiplicity of Bus Stops in this area would result in increased journey times and loss of efficiency to public transport in this corridor.

The provision of the Bus Stop on Infirmary Road would require the removal of approximately 13 on street parking spaces at this location, as the on street parking is nose to kerb.

The lack of parking facilities in the vicinity of Victoria Hospital and the main South Infirmary Hospital would be further worsened by the removal of the on street parking in this area, and for these reasons, the provision of a Bus Stop at Infirmary Road had not previously been recommended.

Cork Corporation, together with Bus Eireann, are currently in the process of appointing a Transportation Consultant to examine two major bus routes in the city network, with the view to identifying all aspects of Bus and Traffic Operation in the area, which will include identifying potential Bus Priorities, Bus Lanes, Improvements to Bus Stop locations, and facility at Bus Stops etc. The Consultants transported along the corridors and will also examine the conflicting needs for road space e.g. Infirmary Road.

The Consultants report, when completed, will make a recommendation on Whole Route basis and will be recommended to Council for consideration and approval to be implemented, if approved, as soon as possible.

The question regarding the re-location of a Bus Stop to Infirmary Road will be examined as part of that proposal.

3.2 **KINSALE ROAD LANDFILL**

In response to question submitted by Comhairleoir J. Minihan, the following written reply was circulated which stated that the works being carried out at the Sanitary Landfill Site, Kinsale Road consist of:-

1. Construction of Palisade Fencing 2.4m high (2.4 km)
2. Leachate Conditioning Plant
3. Hardstandings
4. Access Roads
5. Construction of Civic Amenity Site, including provision of Bins and Reinforced Earth Retaining Wall
6. Services Including Drainage, CCTV, Ducting, Pump Sumps, Lighting and Power Distribution
7. Substation and Administration Buildings
8. Pumped Leachate Collection System
9. HDPE (High Density Polyethylene) and Clay Lined Ponds
10. Reed Beds
11. Perimeter Roads and Swales
12. Services
13. Sheet Pile Cut Off Wall
14. Construction of Weighbridge
15. Relocation of ESB Cables

3.3 **CLOSURE OF ALLEYS**

In response to question submitted by Comhairleoir T. Brosnan, the following written reply was circulated which stated that at a meeting of the North West Ward held on 15th January, 2001, the Members agreed to proceed with the proposed extinguishments of the Rights of Way at Frankfield Steps, 4/5 Silversprings Court, 70/71 Silversprings Court and Murmont Road to Murmont Crescent (near the Tank Field). The public consultation process will be commenced within the next two weeks. The Corporation is obliged, under the provisions of Section 73 of the Roads Act 1993, to publish a notice in a newspaper, circulating in the area, giving notice of its intention to extinguish the Right of Way. The notice will advise that the proposal, including a site location map, will be available for public inspection for one month and that submissions may be made for a further two weeks. In addition, similar notifications will be displayed on each end of laneway for 14 days. The proposal is also forwarded to each of the statutory utilities and to in-house Corporation Departments to ascertain if they have any services in the Right of Way to be extinguished. If no objections are received to the proposed extinguishment, a report will be prepared for consideration of the Roads Transportation & Safety Committee and subsequently for the City Council. If objections are received, it may be necessary to have a Public Enquiry before moving to recommendation stage. The proposal to extinguish a public Right of Way is a reserved function.

3.4 **HORGANS BUILDINGS**

In response to question submitted by Seanoir D. McCarthy, the following written response was circulated which stated that Seanoir McCarthy previously submitted a motion (00/157) requesting that Horgan's Buildings be cul de saced in order to prevent through traffic between Magazine Road and College Road. In my reply at that time I indicated that the feasibility of this proposal would be reviewed.

Since then the extension of Disc Parking to the area has been implemented. In addition, kerbing has been laid on the south side of the green to exert control on indiscriminate parking and the roads within Horgans Building have all been surfaced.

A review of traffic movements and physical limitations on the provision of access to Horgan's Buildings from the south side only indicated that the provision of a cul de sac would not be of significant benefit to the estate.

5. **TWINNING COMMITTEE**

5.1 **PROPOSED VISIT TO SAN FRANCISCO**

An Chomhairle considered the recommendation of the Twinning Committee that Cork Corporation would visit our twinned city San Francisco and that An tArd-Mheára Comhairleoir P.J. Hourican, Chairperson of the Twinning Committee Comhairleoir Mary Shields, Chairperson of San Francisco Twinning sub-committee Comhairleoir Donal Counihan, and Comhairleoir Bernard Allen T.D. would represent the city on this occasion

Seanoir J. Dennehy T.D. proposed and Comhairleoir T. Brosnan seconded that the recommendation be accepted.

Deputy Lord Mayor declared Seanoir O'Connell's proposal defeated and the recommendation of the Twinning Committee approved.

5.2 **TWINNING GRANT APPLICATIONS 2001**

In accordance with the recommendation of the Twinning Committee An Chomhairle approved twinning grants totalling £5,000 as set out in the schedule "Twinning Grants 2001".

6. **LIBRARY COMMITTEE**

An Chomhairle agreed to defer to the next meeting the nomination of a replacement to the Library Committee following the resignation of Eileen Murphy.

7. **ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE**

7.1 **SANITARY AND OTHER SCHEMES**

In accordance with the recommendation of the Environment Committee from its meeting held on 20th March 2001, An Chomhairle noted the report of the Assistant City Manager on Sanitary and Other Schemes for the month ended 28th February 2001.

7.2 **LITTER MANAGEMENT PLAN**

In accordance with the recommendation of the Environment Committee from its meeting held on 20th March 2001, An Chomhairle approved the report of Assistant City Manager dated 14th March 2001. The report stated that the Corporation Litter Management Plan was prepared by a committee consisting of representatives from the Garda Síochána, Cork Chamber of Commerce, Cork/Kerry Tourism, Cork Community Development Institute; Cork Primary Schools, Cork Secondary Schools, Cork Business Association, IBEC and officials from the Environment Section, Cork Corporation.

The plan was formally adopted by Council in June 1998 and was launched by the Minister of State at the Department of the Environment and Local Government, Deputy Dan Wallace on 23rd July 1998 in the presence of the Lord Mayor.

Set out hereunder is a report on the operation of the plan for the year to the 31st December 2000 as required by Section 10(3) of the Litter Pollution Act 1997.

The plan identified a number of key elements. These may be summarised as initiatives on enforcement, capital investment, cleansing, public education and community/business partnership.

Council as part of its commitment to eradication of litter from the city and to oversee the implementation of the Litter Management Plan set up a special Litter Management Committee. The Committee is currently reviewing the operation of the Litter Management Plan and has held a number of meetings in this regard. A draft of the proposed amendments will be available for consideration by Council shortly.

1. **ENFORCEMENT**

Four Litter Wardens implemented the provisions of the Litter Pollution Act in relation to littering, dumping, public education etc.

A total of 634 (674) fines were issued by Cork Corporation with 4(8) cases for which legal proceedings were instituted without the issue of a fine on the spot notice. In addition, a total of 25(32) fines were issued by the Gardai. These figures are up to the 31st December 2000.

Fines ranging from £20 to £300 have been imposed in court proceedings.

2. **RESOURCES**

The following resources were allocated to street sweeping litter/abatement during the year.

- (a) One Schmidt Sweeping Machine
- (b) Three Green Machines*
- (c) One Grime Buster Machine
- (d) Five Suction Sweepers
- (e) 40 additional Litter Bins
- (f) Cigarette and Chewing Gum receptacles

* An additional Green Machine was purchased during the year.

In addition to the normal complement of staff 30 additional sweepers were recruited during the summer months to cover holidays and to give additional coverage in the city centre and other areas.

3. CLEANSING

Wheel bins have now been introduced in 95% of the city and has resulted in a noticeable reduction in the amount of litter previously created by the bin and bag system, where because of poor presentation etc. the refuse was attacked by dogs, birds etc. on collection days.

Arising from the introduction of the wheel bin system a number of staff have been released from collection duties and redeployed to sweeping duties. The street sweeping schedules in the city centre and suburbs are being reviewed with a view to giving as much improved service in all parts of the city.

4. PUBLIC EDUCATION

School visits were again carried out during the year and talks were given to the pupils on litter and problems associated with it.

The Lord Mayor during his visit to schools and on numerous other occasions also highlighted the urgent need to tackle the litter problem by everybody – general public, schools, businesses, community groups etc.

The Tidy Schools Competition and the Tidy Districts competition were run during the year. A total of 35 schools, 33 Estates and 8 Industrial sites took part.

A special Environment Award sponsored by Cork Chamber of Commerce was launched during the year. This award is aimed at setting standards for clean, litter free and attractive streets.

Advertising has been availed of in local media to get the message across that litter is not acceptable and a number of radio and press interviews have been given to local media to highlight the Corporation's commitment to the eradication of this problem from our city.

Funding was received during the year from the Department of the Environment towards a school education programme.

5. COMMUNITY/BUSINESS PARTNERSHIP

All Community Associations were circulated with a copy of the Litter Management Plan and their co-operation sought in its implementation.

Corporation officials in the course of meetings with Community groups and residents associations highlighted the litter problem.

As part of the Togher Integrated Services Process litter was identified as one area where the Corporation and local communities could cooperate in the delivery of services and a Litter monitoring regime was put in place during the year to assess progress in this area. A special competition was jointly organised by Cork County Council and Cork Corporation for estates in the area. 300 skips for clean ups of areas were made available to a number of Residents Associations during the year.

Under the Environmental Partnership Fund in association with “We The People”, the Estate Management Committee and the Environment Section, 30 skips were jointly – provided for a clean up of the Knocknaheeny/Hollyhill area during 2000.

Two groups of workers under the Corporation/FAS Community Employment Scheme have been engaged on a continual clean up of various areas of the city targeting in particular litter black spots, derelict sites etc.

A forum for discussion with Cork Business Association and Cork Chamber of Commerce has been set up through the offices of the City Centre Coordinator. Street representatives have been appointed and each has been given a contact number in the Corporation. Regular meetings take place with street representatives.

6. GENERAL

It has been noted that where a group of residents are committed to an anti-litter policy that these estates are generally much cleaner than others.

It is intended following on the introduction of wheelbins to contact all Residents’ Association over the coming months to again seek their cooperation.

All of the areas targeted in the litter plan will continue to be addressed in 2001.

One of the main sources of litter is the abuse of litter bins by persons who place ordinary domestic waste in the bins. This results in the bins being filled to overflowing very soon after their being emptied and defeats the whole purpose of providing litter bins in the first place. A number of fines have been issued against these offenders and this policy will continue to be enforced.

7. URBAN VILLAGES

Bishopstown took part in the Tidy Towns Urban Village Section of the National Tidy Towns Competition and the Corporation assisted in a clean up of the area.

8. NATIONAL SPRING CLEAN 2000

The Corporation members and staff took an active part in National Spring Clean 2000 which was organised on a countrywide basis by An Taisce.

The springclean was launched by the Minister of State at the Department of Environment and Local Government, Deputy Dan Wallace who personally visited the areas and estates taking part in the clean up.

As part of the spring clean the Corporation identified a number of areas for special attention eg. Commons Road, Popham's field etc.

A number of resident associations actively took part in the activities and skips, bags and gloves were made available by the Corporation. In the course of the year it came to our attention that skips provided for cleanup of some areas were being used as a means of disposal of unwanted large household items resulting in the skips being unable to be availed of for estate clean up purposes. Consequently, plastic bags and gloves were made available to assist in clean ups and the bags were collected by Corporation staff. This proved to be successful and it is intended to continue the same procedure in the current year.

The Corporation are represented on a National Litter Advisory Committee by the Assistant City Manager and Senior Executive Engineer. The above reports sets out the main areas of activity in relation to litter that the Corporation was involved in during 2000.

While progress continues to be made, it cannot be overemphasised that the main sources of litter are people who use the city streets and until attitudes change, either by prosecution or otherwise, that will continue to be a problem.

An Chomhairle also noted the Committee's decision to publish names of persons successfully prosecuted under the Litter Pollution Act.

7.3 GLEN RESOURCE CENTRE

In accordance with the recommendation of the Environment Committee from its meeting held on 20th March 2001, An Chomhairle approved that An t-Ard-Mheára or his nominee would be a member of the Board of the Management Company.

7.4 **CASTLE ROAD**

In accordance with the recommendation of the Environment Committee from its meeting held on 20th March 2001, An Chomhairle approved the report of the Assistant City Manager dated 15th March 2001 on the following motion which was referred to the Committee by An Chomhairle:-

"That the Corporation provide a car park in association with the pedestrian amenity walk in Mahon which commences at Castle Road and terminates in Rochestown in the interests of traffic safety".

(Proposer: Comhairleoir D. Counihan - Ref. 01/030)

The report stated that parking of vehicles by persons using the amenity walk is causing serious congestion along Castle Road. As part of the overall Mahon development and as previously agreed by Council to relieve this it is proposed to provide a car park with 100 spaces on an area of land adjacent to the start of the Mahon walkway. Plans of the proposal will be available at the meeting. A notice under the Local Government (Planning and Development) Regulations 1994 as amended will be published shortly.

7.5 **PARK OWEN**

In accordance with the recommendation of the Environment Committee from its meeting held on 20th March 2001, An Chomhairle approved the report of the Assistant City Manager dated 15th March 2001 on the following motion which was referred to the Committee by An Chomhairle:-

"That Cork Corporation create a high quality Playground at Park Owen to cater for the needs of the children in the surrounding areas".

(Proposer: Comhairleoir S. Martin - Ref. 00/196)

The report stated that the Parks Strategy criteria for the provision of new quality playgrounds are that they are enclosed parks so as to avoid vandalism of play equipment. As Park Owen is not an enclosed park it is not deemed suitable for the location of a new playground.

7.6 **BERLINGFORD DRIVE**

In accordance with the recommendation of the Environment Committee from its meeting held on 20th March 2001, An Chomhairle approved the report of the Assistant City Manager dated 15th March 2001 on the following motion which was referred to the Committee by An Chomhairle:-

"That Cork Corporation would clean up the green area in Berlingford Drive, Church Road and replace the fence between Berlingford Drive and Clontarf Estate".

(Proposer: Seanoir T. Shannon - Ref. 00/307)

The report stated the green area in question will be cleaned and fence repaired shortly.

7.7 **WATER FLUORIDATION**

An Chomhairle considered the recommendation of the Environment Committee from its meeting held on 20th March 2001, that the following motions which were referred to the Committee by An Chomhairle be approved:-

- (a)"That this Council has no confidence in the state's continuing policy of mandatory water fluoridation."

- (b)"That this Council make a submission to the Advisory Group established by the Minister for Health and Children on the continuing addition of fluoride to public water supplies, expressing its wish that this practice be ended."

7.8 **GLASHEEN RIVER**

In accordance with the recommendation of the Environment Committee from its meeting held on 20th March 2001, An Chomhairle approved the report of the Assistant City Manager on the following motion which was referred to the Committee by An Chomhairle:-

"That Cork Corporation take immediate action to deal with the intolerable condition of the land on the banks of the Glasheen River where it abounds Deanrock Estate, Riverview Estate and Sandymount Avenue and to clean up what has now become an obvious public health hazard. The affected area, which is located inside the safety railings adjoining the river, is totally overgrown, is unhygienic, stinking and is now rat infested and therefore a major danger to public health in the area."

(Proposer: Seanoir J. Dennehy T.D. - Ref. 01/011)

The report of the Assistant City Manager stated that the riverbank would be cleaned shortly. The question of painting the railings was also raised and the Assistant City Manager undertook to examine the position.
