# 6. **QUESTION TIME**

## 6.1 <u>ACTIVE TRAVEL MEASURES – FRANKFIELD ROAD</u>

In response to the following question submitted by Comhairleoir S. O'Callaghan, a written reply was circulated as outlined below:-

The Active Travel Measures on Frankfield Road Scheme was passed by Cork City Council on 13<sup>th</sup> February 2023. Could the Chief Executive please provide an update on the proposed scheme, including:-

- details regarding NTA funding for the scheme?
- details regarding the current status of the scheme and when it is likely to move to the next stage of the process?
- the approximate date upon which it is hoped to commence work on the scheme?
- the approximate date upon which it is hoped that the scheme will be completed and ready for use by the public?

## **REPLY**

The proposed Frankfield Road Active Travel Scheme provides for the installation of improved pedestrian and cycle facilities on Frankfield Road in Douglas. The main elements of the scheme include the installation of segregated cycle facilities, footpath widening, provision of raised tables at junctions, traffic calming measures, toucan crossing modifications, new signalised pedestrian crossing and cycle crossing facilities, additional green space & planting, road realignments and new markings.

The scheme was approved by Council earlier this year following a public consultation process under Section 38 of the Road Traffic Act, as amended. Funding for the design and planning phases of the scheme has been provided by the National Transport Authority. The project is currently being progressed through the detailed design stage and tender documents will be ready in the coming months. The works will be tendered thereafter subject to confirmation of continued funding for the construction phase of the scheme. Details of the next round of annual funding are expected to be confirmed in early new year and members will be further updated following receipt of same. The construction period for the scheme is estimated at circa 10 months.

#### 6.2 FLOOD PREVENTION FOR RIVERVIEW ESTATE & GLENDALE

In response to the following question submitted by Comhairleoir G. Kelleher, a written reply was circulated as outlined below:-

To ask the Chief Executive for an update on the flood prevention actions being taken for Riverview Estate and Glendale in Glasheen. Both estates suffered from flooding during recent storms on August 18<sup>th</sup> and on October 18<sup>th</sup>. Local residents believe that during one or both of the aforementioned events the culvert may have been blocked and they are also concerned about the level of maintenance of the Glasheen River. I would like to ask the Chief Executive for a reply to the above two points and also to provide me with details of what actions Cork City Council is taking to prevent this type of flooding happening in future.

#### **REPLY**

In response to predicted heavy rainfall and storm warnings, Cork City Council Drainage Crews inspect all gratings and trash screens across the City. I can confirm that such inspections were carried out in advance of the storm events of the 18<sup>th</sup> August, 27<sup>th</sup> September and 18<sup>th</sup> October 2023 on the Glasheen River adjacent to Riverview Estate. In all three instances, the trash screen and culvert on the Glasheen River were free and clear of blockages.

During Storm Betty on the 18<sup>th</sup> August significant flooding was experienced in Glasheen Estate. This flooding was due to extreme rainfall which exceeded the capacity of the river channel.

In response to this, flooding representations from residents and locals concerned about the risk of flooding were received. On foot of these, emergency works were carried out on the Glasheen River. These works commenced on Monday 18<sup>th</sup> September and ceased on Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> October. The works were carried out to improve conveyance and reduce the risk of flooding. The works involved the clearing and removal of debris and vegetation that may give rise to blockages. Silt was removed from the river to improve conveyance.

During Storm Agnes on the 27<sup>th</sup> September, the extreme rainfall led to significantly high river levels, but the Glasheen River did not overtop the riverbank due to the emergency works carried out.

However during Storm Babet on the 18<sup>th</sup> October, significant flooding was experienced in Glasheen Estate again. This flooding was due to extreme rainfall which exceeded the capacity of the river channel. Storm Babet was different to the earlier two flooding events in that it was an orange rain warning and resulted in significantly more rainfall in this area than either of the two previous events. The size and scale of the Babet Storm event cannot be underestimated. This was a very serious rainfall and flooding event, right across the entire City, and indeed the Country.

Cork City Council is reviewing what future interventions could be deployed along the Glasheen River to reduce the occurrence of flooding events during extreme rainfall

occurrences. When suitable interventions are identified funding will be sought to implement same.

## 6.3 TAKING IN CHARGE – RIVERVIEW RISE

In response to the following question submitted by Comhairleoir K. O'Flynn, a written reply was circulated as outlined below:-

Could the CE kindly confirm the anticipated date when Cork City Council will be taking charge of the Estate of Riverview Rise?

#### **REPLY**

Planning Reference No. 04/28230 Riverview Rise estate has several elements still outstanding to progress the Taking in Charge (TIC) Application.

The main issue is the requirement for wayleaves involving multiple properties and owners. The timeline for completing this exercise, given the interaction with 3<sup>rd</sup> parties, is unknown. Consultation has occurred with residents in relation to wayleave requirements.

Other outstanding elements which require funding allocation are as-builts drawings and minor roads/footpath issues. In addition, a Drainage CCTV/Manhole Inspection is due to conclude Q1 2024 where CCC Estates Team will be able to estimate costs for works, if required, to the combined network.

#### **REPLY**

Verification of the detailed design cost of the Events Centre has now been completed. Cork City Council is currently engaging with the consortium on the outcome of this verification process and will in due course be making a recommendation to the department as to the amount of the public contribution required.

It is anticipated that construction will commence in Q1 2024.

## 6.6 **APPROVED HOUSING BODY DWELLINGS**

In response to the following question submitted by Comhairleoir K. Collins, a written reply was circulated as outlined below:-

To ask the City Manager for a list of Approved Housing Body dwellings that have been vacant for 6 months or more, as of 1<sup>st</sup> December, setting out, in each case:

The address?
The reason for the vacancy?
The name of the Approved Housing Body?
And the length of the vacancy?

#### **REPLY**

For security reasons, it is not appropriate to list addresses of any vacant properties managed by Cork City Council or Approved Housing Bodies in Cork city. As of 1<sup>st</sup> December, 2023 six number Approved Housing Body properties are vacant for over 6 months or more. Of this six, four are currently under offer and 2 are being tenanted on 11<sup>th</sup> December, 2023. One of the four currently under offer was previously refused and is on offer number 2 to an applicant.

In the case of two of the properties the vacancy arose as the tenants surrendered their tenancy. In another case the tenant moved to residential care, and in the remaining three cases the vacancy arose due to the death of the tenant.

Properties provided or managed by Approved Housing Bodies are not recorded on our iHouse system, therefore the monitoring of vacancies is dependent on information received from the Approved Housing Body. In recent months, Cork City Council has agreed with the management of the main Approved Housing Bodies that they will submit a monthly report detailing new tenancies created during the previous month and current vacancies, this arrangement will be progressed with all Approved Housing Bodies in 2024. In addition, we meet regularly with the management of each Approved Housing Body to review vacancies, new developments and any issues arising with nominations.

It is envisaged that Approved Housing Body properties will migrate onto iHouse in 2024, which will also allow us to monitor vacancies as we monitor vacancies within our own stock.

# 6.7 **CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION**

In response to the following question submitted by Comhairleoir C. Finn, a written reply was circulated as outlined below:-

Will the successful procedure (where trees were shredded and removed up to 10pm) that was implemented in January 2023 for the Christmas tree collection at Clashduv recycling centre be repeated in 2024?

#### **REPLY**

The same procedure as last year will continue for the Clashduv site the details of same are below.

The official sites that the public can drop off trees at are as follows:

- Gus Healy Swimming Pool, Ballinlough (green adjacent)
- Clashduv Park, Togher (adjacent to bring bank site)
- Ballincollig Regional Park, Ballincollig (green adjacent to bring bank site)
- Murmont Road, Montenotte (green adjacent)
- Sam Allen Sports Complex, Gurranabraher (green adjacent)
- Tramore Valley Park, South Link Road
- Cork City Council Office, Glanmire T45 YD83 (green area at front)

The procedure for last year was that all trees at the site of Clashduv Park, Togher will be shredded daily, resulting in no trees being at that site after 17.00.

Gardaí have been written to seeking monitoring assistance at the Clashduv, Togher site.

Regular inspections will also be carried out by Cork City Council staff to ensure trees are being removed throughout January.

Extra security will be in place at the site in Clashduv up until 10pm during the busy period.

## 6.8 <u>CITY NORTH WEST REGENERATION SCHEME</u>

In response to the following question submitted by Comhairleoir M. Nugent, a written reply was circulated as outlined below:-

Can the CE report on any progress ensuring that Phase 2C of the City North West Regeneration Scheme is finished out in the near future?

#### **REPLY**

The construction site on Kilmore Road, Knocknaheeny forms part of the City Northwest Quarter Regeneration Programme, and part of Cork City Council's wider social housing delivery programme.

The project is, however, the subject of a complex contractual dispute. There is a quality control issue with the works on site which the employer, Cork City Council, is addressing contractually with the main building contractor.

Works are not currently being progressed on site by the contractor. Cork City Council is treating this with the utmost priority and is seeking to progress a prompt solution to this matter with a view to the earliest possible delivery of more quality homes at this location. The project is subject to legal and commercial privilege due to the contractual dispute, with the consequence that further detail cannot be provided at this time.

## 6.9 TRIAL REALLOCATION TRAFFIC WARDEN HOURS

In response to the following question submitted by Comhairleoir D. Boyle, a written reply was circulated as outlined below:-

To ask the Chief Executive if the trial reallocation of traffic warden hours has to date found many tickets being issued between 6.30pm and 8.30pm, on applicable days and if so, what parts of the City are such tickets being issued?

#### **REPLY**

As advised to Members in September, an additional budget to pay for a parking enforcement pilot to deliver an out of hours extended service on a pilot basis (evenings and Sunday) was requested as part of Budget 2024 process. I can now confirm that €30,000 has been approved in the 2024 Budget to fund this pilot project. This will allow us to deliver the pilot project during 2024. At the end of this pilot an evaluation will be undertaken. This will inform our 2025 budget application process.

# 6.10 <u>ILLEGAL PARKING ON MACCURTAIN STREET</u>

In response to the following question submitted by Comhairleoir O. Moran, a written reply was circulated as outlined below:-

To ask the Chief Executive if there is anything preventing parking tickets being issued for vehicles parked on paving next to double yellow lines on MacCurtain Street; and the number of tickets that have been issued for illegal parking on MacCurtain Street, broken down by category, since the revised street layout was formally opened on 25 November, 2023?

#### **REPLY**

The areas in question can now be the subject of parking enforcement in accordance with the parking lines and signs which are in place. All signage and lining works associated with the MacCurtain Street Public Transport Improvement Scheme are complete save for the introduction of a night time taxi rank outside the laundrette and Café Spresso which will be installed over the coming weeks.

Parking Enforcement since the re-opening of the street has involved liaising with drivers to advise what is permissible on the street together with enforcement. Tickets issued to date are outlined below.

# 6.11 **PUBLIC LIGHTING – CURRAHEEN ESTATE**

In response to the following question submitted by Comhairleoir O. O'Leary, a written reply was circulated as outlined below:-

To ask the CE given the removal of several public lighting columns in Curraheen Estate, Bishopstown, what actions will be taken to ensure that lighting levels in the estate are sufficient to detect hazards at night and ensure adherence to health and safety requirements? Many residents are worried that this currently isn't the case.

What does this plan entail and when will it be implemented? Will it contain the very necessary and urgent engagement with residents, and will it ensure that replacement public lighting columns are placed in the nearest public domain?"

#### **REPLY**

Cork City Council are constantly upgrading public lighting throughout the city through either maintenance works or dedicated capital projects. Currently 35% of all lighting in Curraheen Estate has been upgraded to LED lanterns with 50% of the public lighting columns within Curraheen estate due for renewal through a capital works programme which is currently scheduled to begin in 2024.

As with all new lighting designs carried out in Cork City, the Public Lighting Section looks for the most energy efficient design for each installation (to help ensure Cork City Council meets its 2030 emissions requirements), while also ensuring that appropriate lighting levels are provided. New public lighting installations are designed using the current EN:13201 public lighting design standards.

## 7.1 CORK CITY CASUAL TRADING BYE-LAWS 2023

"It is hereby resolved to make the proposed Cork City Casual Trading Byelaws, 2023 in accordance with Section 6 (9) of the Casual Trading Act, 1995 and that these Bye-Laws shall come into operation on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of March 2024. The new Bye-Laws shall come into force and effect on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of March, 2024, being not less than 30 days after the Council meeting adopting and making these bye-laws, in accordance with the provisions of Section 200(5)(a) of the Local Government Act, 2001."

# 7.2 **PROPERTY DISPOSALS**

Disposal of the freehold interest in four sites (Blocks 28, 31, 32 and 34) within the residential development of Newton Heights, Boherboy Road, Lotamore, Mayfield, Cork, to Lyonshall Ltd and Clancy Project Management Ltd in equal shares as tenants in common c/o, Niall Daly, Solicitor, BDM Boylan, Clarkes Bridge House, Hanover Street, Cork, for the sum of €405,900 (inclusive of VAT).

# 7.3 <u>CAPITAL ASSISTANCE SCHEME: 5 ST. DOMINICK'S TERRACE, FRENCH'S QUAY, CORK - GALTAN CLG</u>

An Chomhairle considered and approved the report of the Director of Services, Housing, dated 23<sup>rd</sup> November 2023 in relation to a loan facility for Galtan CLG in respect of the provision of one unit of accommodation at 5 St. Dominick's Terrace, French's Quay, Cork.

On the proposal of Comhairleoir S. Martin, seconded by Comhairleoir M. Finn, An Chomhairle further agreed to adopt the following Resolution:-

"Resolved that, pursuant to the provision of Section 6 of the Housing (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1992, a loan facility not exceeding €284,531.30 be granted to Galtan CLG, subject to the terms of the Capital Assistance Scheme for the provision of one unit of accommodation at 5 St. Dominick's Terrace, French's Quay, Cork."

# 7.4 <u>CAPITAL ASSISTANCE SCHEME: 88 SUNDAYS WELL ROAD, CORK - GALTAN CLG</u>

An Chomhairle considered and approved the report of the Director of Services, Housing, dated 23<sup>rd</sup> November 2023 in relation to a loan facility for Galtan CLG in respect of the provision of 2 no. units at 88 Sundays Well Road, Cork.

On the proposal of Comhairleoir M. Nugent, seconded by Comhairleoir D. Boylan, An Chomhairle further agreed to adopt the following Resolution:-

"Resolved that, pursuant to the provision of Section 6 of the Housing (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1992, a loan facility not exceeding €393,112.80 be granted to Galtan CLG, subject to the terms of the Capital Assistance Scheme for the provision of 2 no. units at 88 Sundays Well Road, Cork."

#### 11.2.1 CIVIC AMENITY CENTRES IN THE NORTHSIDE

An Chomhairle considered and approved the report of the Director of Services, Roads & Environment Operations, dated 15<sup>th</sup> November 2023 on the following motion:-

'That Cork City Council setup publicly owned civic amenity centres on the northside of the city. This would be a good start and improve recycling in the area and to stop fly tipping.'

(Proposer: Cllr. K. Collins 23/218)

The report of the Director of Services stated that that Cork City Council does not have plans at present to develop a Civic Amenity Site on the north side of the city.

The Council currently operates a very substantial Civic Amenity Site at Kinsale Road (part of Tramore Valley Park) where a range of disposal and recycling options are available to the public.

This site provides a city wide service and in fact is used by members of the public from neighbouring Local Authorities.

Developing a new Civic Amenity Site will entail significant costs (site purchase, capital and operating costs). These costs are not budgeted for at present.

Developing a Civic Amenity Site will also require significant time, energy and resources in terms of seeking planning permission, obtaining a waste licence from the EPA, assessing the impacts of facility operations as well as assessing the need for same given the very small geographic footprint of the City Council's administrative area.

There will also most likely be other challenges in terms of objections from residents, nearby businesses, and industry etc.

The Council does not outright dismiss the proposal for developing a northside Civic Amenity Site; it is however, not on the immediate project development list, at this time.

As the implementation of the Circular Economy and Miscellaneous Provisions Act 2022 progresses there may be opportunities to explore options for expanding the Civic Amenity site provision across the City.

# 11.2.2 PILOT 'DOG PARK' AT LEE FIELDS

An Chomhairle considered and approved the report of the Director of Services, Roads & Environment Operations, dated 15<sup>th</sup> November 2023 on the following motion:-

'That a cordoned-off area in the Lee Fields, currently used by dog walkers while waterworks are ongoing, is considered for a pilot 'dog park' in light of previous requests for same in other parks which were deemed too expensive. Minor upgrades to the current set up may well satiate the need for such a park where dogs can be let off-lead.'

(Proposer: Cllr. M. Finn 23/229)

The report of the Director of Services stated that during the laying of a new trunk water main, as part of the Western Trunk Watermain Project, an area of the Lee Fields was cordoned off as a construction site to accommodate the laying of the main. These works are now completed, the fencing removed and the area in question back in public use. The Lee Fields are very popular for walkers and others for informal recreation space and any reduction in the open space along the linear park would have a negative impact on the amenity users.

Following discussions with other Local Authorities, a Draft Plan was developed for the creation of a Dog Park. This would require a large area, allowing for the segregation of small and larger dogs. The Regional Park was identified as a possible site, but the cost of provision was close to  $\in$  100k, with no available budget to bring it to fruition. Should the required funding be provided going forward, this project will be progressed.

#### 11.2.3 PARKS IN THE NORTH WEST AND NORTH EAST WARD

'To ask Council to set out:

The report of the Director of Services stated that Cork City Council's Parks & Recreation staff, including the Tree Officer and the Biodiversity Officer currently engage with a wide variety of stakeholders and community groups such as Tidy Districts Committees, Residents Associations etc. to facilitate and carry out the Council's annual planting program. The Council has planted on average over 4000 trees each year since 2021, with a similar level of planting anticipated going forward. Any new specific requests can be referred to the Tree Officer for attention.

Available public land for planting has been assessed through a variety of methods including digital mapping software, engagement with stakeholders, community groups and elected members.

# 11.2.5 COMMUNICATION FROM UISCE ÉIREANN RE WATER OUTAGES

A letter can issue to Uisce Eireann on behalf of Council asking them to review their public communications strategy.
